Our facilities must support a safe and well-rounded education, and it is clear that updates are necessary. The vote will be conducted by mail-in ballot only. Ballots will be distributed in mid-September and must be returned by October 14th.

Our Volleyball and Cross Country teams are off to a strong start, our Football team is gearing up for an exciting season, and our Cheer team is ready to rally our fans. This is a great time of year to come out and watch our students pursue success beyond the classroom.

Welcome Back Students

The Nebraska Council of School Administrators were here on our first day of school to do a story on our "Welcome Back/GLOW Day." The day ended with a neon pep rally that the kids really enjoyed. This will be a great school year. I think the wolves are going to prevail in a number of ways this year. We hope we have a lot to write about this year. Maybe they will come back and do another story. When it comes out we will try to make it available for everyone to read.

School Traffic

Remember that school is now in session and the speed limit around school is 15mph. Please watch your speed and, especially, please watch for students crossing the streets. We hope that they are watching out for you, too. The last thing any of us want to deal with is a tragic accident. Please be mindful.

Cell Phones

Remind your students of the cell phone policy. For our 7-12 students, phones are only allowed before school, between classes at lockers, and in the Old Gym during the lunch period. Otherwise they are not allowed unless a teacher requests them for a project in their class. No cell phones in any locker rooms. 1st offense: lose the phone for a day and serve 1 detention. 2nd offense: lose the phone for 2 weeks and serve 2 detentions. 3rd offense: lose the phone for the rest of the year and serve 3 detentions. If we feel like we are having a problem we reserve the right to ban phones from school completely.

Water Bottles and Food

We ask that all water bottles be clear. If students bring additives (flavor packs) that are mixed in, they mix it in front of a staff member. Students will not be permitted to bring in soda, coffee, gator aid, power aide, etc. The student may drink it in the foyer or throw it away. Same for food. Food may not be stored in lockers. We want to avoid mice and bugs at all costs if we can.

Dress Code

Make sure your students are wearing clean clothes daily. No ripped shirts. Shorts should meet mid thigh. Spaghetti straps must be three fingers wide. No pajama pants. No midriff showing. Dress in layers. More in the handbook.

On Aug<mark>ust 21 and</mark> 22, we had the privilege of having Rob Miller from Proactive Coaching come talk to our parents, coach<mark>es, and stu</mark>dents in thre<mark>e separate meetings. There was some overlap between the three, but there were also clear messages targeted at each group. He had some great tips:</mark>

- 1. Before competition: Know your athlete's goals, roles, and needs for their team, and accept them. Release them to the game, their coach, and their team.
- 2. During competition: Model poise, confidence, and correct behavior. Focus on the team.
- 3. After competition: Give them time and space. Be a confidence builder.

Rob had many great things to say about activities and life. I believe he was very well received and we hope that everyone took something away from his presentations.

BUILDING A STRONGER FUTURE FOR LOOMIS STUDENTS



- Overcrowded classrooms limit opportunities for student learning.
- Staff working in inadequate spaces such as hallways, without dedicated areas for collaboration.
- Wrestling room space is not adequate or safe for athletes.
- Limited building storage creates daily challenges for teachers and staff.
- No proper space for sick students, limiting our ability to care for children during the school day.
- Lack of space for added classes like Home Economics and Alternative Kindergarten.
- No space for a potential Summer Program, which could expand learning opportunities.
- Aging facilities and HVAC challenges, including a 1954 gym with no air conditioning and elementary hallways without AC.
- Industrial Technology space is too small and unsafe, preventing students from accessing modern shop programs.










THE SOLUTION

- Add 7 new classrooms to relieve overcrowding and support student growth.
- Expand specialized spaces with a larger shop for Industrial Technology, an improved wrestling room, and repurposed areas for added classes like Home Economics and Alternative Kindergarten.
- Support staff and students by adding a dedicated para workspace, nursing station, two small group rooms, two ISS rooms, conference room, and staff lounge.
- Improve food service with a larger cafeteria and expanded kitchen.
- Repurpose existing space by converting the old 1954 gym into classroom space, increasing capacity without the cost of new construction.
- Upgrade HVAC systems to create safe, comfortable, and efficient learning environments.
- Design smarter building flow by separating academic and athletic spaces, improving safety and operations.









! WHY THE BOND MATTERS

SMART, COST-EFFECTIVE DESIGN

The new gym is planned as a steel building. This is a durable and economical option that saves taxpayer dollars without sacrificing quality.

SAFETY FIRST

The current gym is too small, unsafe, and not ADA compliant. A new facility will meet fire codes, provide proper locker rooms, and ensure accessibility for all students.

A COMMUNITY RESOURCE

Beyond student use, the new gym will serve the whole community with features like a walking track and weight room to promote health and wellness.

REPURPOSED SPACE FOR CLASSROOMS

By converting the 1954 gym into classroom space, we expand academic capacity while keeping costs down. This is a practical solution for our landlocked campus.

PREPARING STUDENTS FOR TOMORROW

Expanded STEM and shop spaces will better equip students for careers in science, technology, engineering, and skilled trades, aligning education with future workforce needs.
